#### Joint Allied Powers Demonstration Day Highlight of NATO Exercise Noble Jump 2023 in Sardinia

On Friday, 12 May 2023, NATO exercise Noble Jump 2023 on the Italian island of Sardinia is reaching its pivotal point with the Joint Allied Powers Demonstration Day (JAPDD) at the Italian Armed Forces Training Area Teulada in the south of Sardinia.

In the last two weeks, some 2,200 soldiers from 7 NATO Nations (Germany, The Netherlands, Norway, Czechia, Luxembourg, Belgium and Latvia) with approximately 500 vehicles of various kinds, have deployed to training areas on Sardinia. They have conducted different kinds of military training both in national formations and in joint operations in conjunction with their NATO allies.

Now, all these training activities will be combined in a complex military scenario in a live fire demonstration showcasing the different abilities NATO can field to jointly defend against a land attack.

Heavy military equipment like Leopard 2 Main Battle Tanks from Germany and Norway, CV 90 Infantry Fighting Vehicles from Norway, Boxer GNGP from the Netherlands and German self-propelled howitzers (known as 'Panzerhaubitze 2000') will cooperate with paratroopers from Czechia and infantry from most of the participating nations.

Among other assets, they will be supported by 'Tiger' Attack Helicopters from Germany as well as German and Luxembourgian surveillance drones. In the exercise scenario, German NH 90 Helicopters will evacuate wounded soldiers from the battlefield.

The troops train as part of the Very High Readiness Joint Task Force (VJTF) which is the spearhead of the NATO Response Force (NRF). The VJTF Land component this year is led by the German Armoured Infantry Brigade 37 from Frankenberg in Saxonia, Germany.

Military and civilian dignitaries from the host nation Italy, NATO and other countries will join the 1 ½ hours long demonstration. Italy will be represented by the Deputy Commander Italian Joint Operations Headquarters, Lieutenant General Nicola Lanza De Cristoforis, Italian Air Force. The highest NATO representative will be the Commander of Allied Joint Force Command Naples, Admiral Stuart B. Munsch, US Navy. Leading the JAPDD will be Brigadier General Alexander Krone, German Army, Commander VJTF (Land). Italian and international Media will cover the event.

The aim of Exercise Noble Jump 2023 is to demonstrate the capabilities and integration of NATO forces from across the Alliance. The exercise directly contributes to NATO's deterrence and defence posture and improves the interoperability, readiness and cohesion of Allied forces. By deploying to Sardinia, the VJTF have demonstrated they can deploy NATO forces in the event of crisis. #NobleJump23 #VJTF23




# Fact Sheet Noble Jump 2023




- This year NATO Allied Joint Force Command Naples (JFC Naples) is conducting its Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe (SHAPE)-sponsored, operational and tactical level alert and deploy exercise Noble Jump 2023, in Teulada region, Sardinia, in order to train the NRF.
- The NRF is a technologically advanced, multinational force made up of land, air, maritime and Special Operations Forces components that are rapidly deployable. It provides collective defence and a rapid military response to an emerging crisis. In addition, it can perform peace-support operations, provide protection to critical infrastructure and support disaster relief.
- Approximately 2,200 troops from Allied nations Germany, Norway, Netherlands, Czechia, Belgium, Latvia and Luxembourg has taken part in this exercise in Sardinia
- Command of the NRF rotates annually between the two operational-level NATO headquarters: JFC Naples and JFC Brunssum. JFC Naples will headquarter the NRF for the entirety of 2023.
- Formed in 2002, the NRF provides NATO with a credible, rapidly deployable military option to respond to emerging crisis, underpinning the principle of Collective Defence.
- Noble Jump 2023 is a scheduled operational and tactical level major joint Alert and Deployment Exercise (ALERTEX/DEPLOYEX).
- It will test and train the Very High Readiness Joint Task Force 2023 (VJTF23) under peacetime conditions in planning and conducting an early deployment and employment in a contested environment in the context of an Article 5, Small Joint Operation (SJO) in NATO Strategic Direction South (NSD-S).
- Noble Jump 2023 will accrue additional tactical level training for the deployed forces. Noble Jump 2023 will also be linked to the Joint and Multinational Exercise JOINT STARS 23 (JOST23) scheduled and organized by the Italian Joint Operations HQ (JOHQ).
- This exercise will demonstrate NATO's visible Assurance and NRF's capability to tailor, plan, prepare, deploy and sustain forces.
- Noble Jump 2023 will also demonstrate NRF's ability to provide both assurance and effective deterrence in support of the Alliance.



## **FUCHS APC "PEILER"**



The main purpose of the FUCHS APC "Peiler" (direction finder) is to identify enemy emitters. When using two or more direction finders in a coordinated manner, enemy emitters can be tracked and identified. After a brief analysis of the intelligence gathered, an electromag-netic situation picture may be

provided to the operational or tactical level. This electromagnetic situation picture may warn a commander of immediate threats and/or support the decision to take countermeasures. In a national and collective defence scenario, the direction finder will be deployed 3-5 km behind the forward edge of battle area (FEBA).

# FUCHS APC "HUMMEL 05/06"



The main purpose of the FUCHS APC (armoured personnel carrier) "HUMMEL 05/06" is to jam enemy radio communication systems by using electronic countermeasures in different frequency ranges. The HUMMEL 05/06 works in tactical combination with other electronic countermeasure systems and may be assigned to a brigade or division. In a national and collective defence scenario, the HUMMEL 05/06 will be deployed 10 km behind the forward edge of battle area (FEBA).

The YAK Luna Transp is a protected vehicle with an add-on transport module. It is mainly used as a carrier vehicle for the LUNA UAS and the system's catapult. The crew is responsible for the proper operation of the drone in coordination with the launch and landing team.



# YAK LUNA BKS



The YAK Luna BKS has a ground control station for the LUNA UAS sensor as an add-on module. It is a mine-protected command and control vehicle used to control the LUNA UAS and operate its sensor. Information obtained from the sensor is processed and submitted to the higher command echelon.

The FENNEK is a light armoured 4WD reconnaissance vehicle operated by a three-man crew and employed in groups of two. A scout party equipped with this vehicle is able to operate independently for a period of up to five days.

# **BOXER GNGP**



The Boxer GNGP is a multi-purpose vehicle that can be used as an infantry, engineer and medical vehicle. Different mission modules can be attached to the drive module within one hour. The infantry module we use provides seating for six dismounts and offers protection against several AT weapons and up to 10 kg AT mines. It is armed with an <u>M151</u> Protector RCWS (.50 cal.).



# MBG280 CDI SOFTTOP



The size and build of the MB G 280 CDI SOFTTOP provide the vehicle with excellent off-road capabilities. It can be used as a base for several weapon systems (7.61 mm GPMG, .50 cal. AGL, SPIKE AT missile). The compact size and relatively quiet engine of the MB G 280 CDI SOFTTOP allow movement close to the enemy. Fitted with one of the weapon systems mentioned above, it makes a dangerous opponent.
